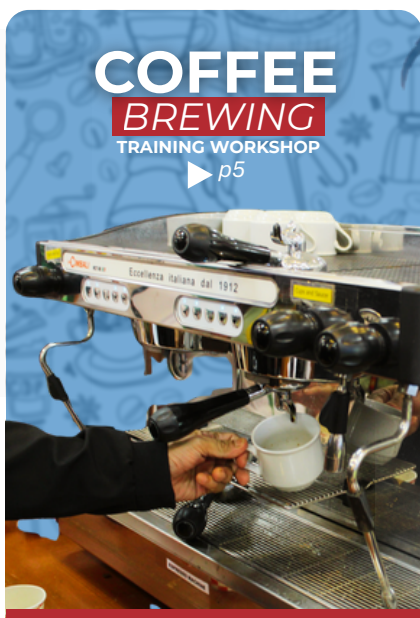

## TSU, South Korea's TSCECPR seal partnership through MOU, creative workshop

**A**nchored on the goal to expand its global academic collaboration, Tarlac State University (TSU) formally inked its partnership with The Story Christian Education and Counseling Psychology Research Institute (TSCECPR) of South Korea through a ceremonial signing of Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and Creative Workshop on Pipe Cleaner Flower Art held on 4 July, at the CFTR AVR.

The event was steered by the Office of International Affairs and Linkages (OIAL), in collaboration with the College of Education – Bachelor of Technology and Livelihood Education (CoEd-BTLED).

On behalf of Dr. Agnes M. Macaraeg, Dr. Aloysius T. Madriaga, Dean of the College of Arts and Social Sciences (CASS)

delivered the opening remarks and welcomed the TSCECPR delegation. “By working with an organization like TSCECPR, we now open new doors for students, faculty, and partner communities to engage in meaningful programs and impactful research initiatives,” Dr. Madriaga said.

Subsequently, Dr. Grace N. Rosete, Director of OIAL, officially introduced the TSU officials present. She also highlighted the internationalization efforts and activities that both institutions have prepared for the coming years.

On the other hand, Dr. Arnold E. Velasco, TSU President, expressed his immense gratitude for the partnership, specifying its significance for the global engagement and innovation of TSU. “We are committing that we’ll be giving our very best in all our might just to make this partnership a successful one,” he also emphasized.

Meanwhile, Dr. Jiyoung Lee, General Director of TSCECPR, expressed optimism about the partnership, highlighting its potential to promote creativity, academic exchange, and intercultural understanding. The first part of the program concluded with closing remarks from Dr. Jasper Jay N. Mendoza, Dean of the College of Education, who acknowledged the collaborative efforts of both institutions and encouraged students to engage in global learning opportunities.

Immediately after the ceremonial signing, a Creative Workshop on Pipe Cleaner Flower Art was held, led by TSCECPR trainer Ms. Jihyeon Loh. The hands-on activity enabled participants to create flowers using simple materials, fostering cultural and artistic exchange.

Overall, the initiative strengthened TSU and TSCECPR’s commitment to global collaboration and internationalization.



## 49 TSU faculty members complete international development program, receive international certification

**T**arlac State University Office of International Affairs and Linkages (TSU-OIAL) and the Wadhvani Operating Foundation (WOF) reached a significant milestone as they celebrated the graduation of 49 TSU faculty members who successfully completed an International Faculty Development Program on November 28, 2025, at the TSU Main Campus in Tarlac City.

The collaboration between the two institutions began to take shape on July 21, 2025, when the participating faculty members embarked on a 14-week online and Direct-to-Faculty (D2F) entrepreneurship training. The sessions were facilitated by Mr. Matt Rodnie Matias of the Wadhvani Operating Foundation. The training covered key topics such as customer identification and needs validation, solution idea generation, competition mapping, opportunity assessment, business modeling, marketing and sales strategies, and financial management for profitability.

During the program, faculty members raised concerns, including connectivity issues and technical difficulties experienced

during online sessions. They also noted that the training coincided with their vacation period, requiring them to attend classes and study during what was intended to be their break. Nonetheless, the training proceeded smoothly overall and did not encounter any major disruptions.

After completing the program, the faculty members qualified to teach technopreneurship courses offered in the undergraduate programs of the College of Engineering, College of Science, and College of Business and Accountancy. This initiative strengthens the capability of faculty members to transfer innovative and relevant knowledge to their students. Graduates of the training received international certifications from WOF and TSU.

TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco said, “This is the first time TSU has held a graduation ceremony specifically for our faculty members, and I must say, I truly enjoyed it. International certification is important for your professional growth, and I am already looking forward to organizing similar programs again in the near future.”

OIAL Director Dr. Grace N. Rosete expressed her continued support, saying, “We in OIAL will always stand behind initiatives that strengthen our faculty. I am excited for the next round of international certification programs with WOF, and I look forward to seeing more TSU educators benefit from these opportunities.”

WOF Country Lead Mr. Cris Delgado shared his optimism, stating that the joint initiative was successful and enjoyable for both TSU faculty participants and WOF facilitators. He encouraged continued enthusiasm and expressed interest in organizing another program soon.

The graduation ceremony was attended by TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco; Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Jasper Jay N. Mendoza; OIAL Director Dr. Grace N. Rosete; College of Business and Accountancy Dean Dr. Jhonel C. Panlilio; College of Engineering Dean Engr. Miriam S. Galvez; and WOF Country Lead Mr. Cris Delgado.

The second batch of the Faculty Development Program is expected to commence in the first or second quarter of 2026.





## TSU joins unveiling of INTACT Base Bulacan Hub

**T**arlac State University (TSU) Director of the Office of International Affairs and Linkages (OIAL), Dr. Grace N. Rosete attended the unveiling ceremony of the INTACT Base (International Talent Circulation Base) Bulacan Hub held at Bulacan State University (BulSU) last October 13, 2025.

The inauguration of the INTACT Base Bulacan Hub at BulSU marks the establishment of the Taiwan International Talent Education Hub in Region III. The Hub aims to serve as a platform for institutional collaboration between Philippine and Taiwanese higher education institutions (HEIs) and to recruit Filipino students for Taiwan's INTENSE Program (International Industrial Talents Education Special Program).

The ceremony was also attended by key officials from the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), including CHED Commissioner Dr. Desiderio R. Apag III; Dr. Lora L. Yusi, Director of CHED Region III; BulSU President Dr. Teody C. San Andres; and representatives of the INTENSE Program, namely Minister Dustin Teng-Shih Yang,

Deputy Representative of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office (TECO) in the Philippines; Dr. Fuh-Jyh Jan, President of the National Chung Hsing University (NCHU); and Dr. Wen-Yuh Jywe, Principal Investigator of the INTENSE Program and professor at the National Taiwan University (NTU).

Following the inauguration, the 2025 INTENSE Program Education Fair Bulacan was held, where partner Taiwanese universities set up booths to engage with students and representatives from Philippine HEIs, promote networking and collaboration opportunities.

In the afternoon, participating universities from Taiwan and attending local HEIs formalized a consortium through the signing of a memorandum of understanding (MOU).

The Philippine HEIs present included Tarlac State University (TSU), Bulacan State University (BulSU), Aurora State College of Technology (ASCOT), Bulacan Agricultural State College (BASC), Central Luzon State University (CLSU), Pampanga State University (PSU), Nueva Ecija

University of Science and Technology (NEUST), Pampanga State Agricultural University (PSAU), Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU), National University – Baliwag (NU-Baliwag), Baliuag University, and City College of Angeles.

Participating Taiwanese universities included National Chung Hsing University, National Cheng Kung University, National Chung Cheng University, National Sun Yat-Sen University, National Formosa University, Chaoyang University of Technology, Dayeh University, I-Shou University, Kaohsiung Medical University, Cheng Shiu University, and Providence University.

Dr. Rosete later expressed interest in bringing the INTENSE Program to Tarlac State University through the INTACT Base Bulacan Hub in Region III and invited the Taiwanese institutions to exploratory meetings for potential collaborations. These are expected to take place in the last quarter of the year, with partnerships projected to be formalized by early 2026.



## TSU conducts coffee brewing training workshop for students and staff

The activities opened on August 12 at Priscilla Hall, TSU Hotel, Villa Lucinda Campus, with the ceremonial MOA signing led by TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco and TSCECPR Advisor Rev. Jeong Youngwoo and their General Director Dr. Jiyoung Lee.

presentation from the Short and Sweet Play Musical Team. The Flower Garden Choir returned with another inspiring performance, further strengthening the cultural connection between the two groups.

The event's learning sessions brought cultural appreciation to a deeper level. The first session was led by Prof. Douglas C. Ferrer, who discussed Philippine Folk Dances, offering participants a glimpse into the country's rich traditions and vibrant artistry. This was followed by Ms. Hwang Wonjung, who shared valuable insights on South Korean Cultural Dance, highlighting its elegance, history, and significance in Korean heritage.

In one of the event's most memorable moments, members of the TSU Performing Arts taught the visiting delegates the Lapay Bantigue, a traditional folk dance from Masbate, giving the guests a hands-on experience of Filipino cultural heritage.

their financial burdens.

Mayor Yap expressed that the local government remains open to further collaborations with TSU in advancing student support initiatives.

The courtesy call highlighted the city government's support for the CPath scholars, who are part of TSU's efforts to provide access to quality education for marginalized students. This initiative reflects TSU's commitment, through the Office of International Affairs and Linkages, to upholding its humanitarian role and promoting inclusivity and academic empowerment.

## TSU welcomes SIMS, strengthens partnership through MOU signing

Tarlac State University (TSU) officially welcomed the delegates from the Swiss Institute of Management and Sciences (SIMS) of Switzerland to formalize their collaboration through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signing held at the TSU Main AVR on November 11, 2025.

Dr. Vu Thi Huong Giang, SIMS Asia-Pacific Regional Director; Ms. Luong Thi Thuy Linh, SIMS Partnership Manager; and Dr. Truong Quang Ai, SIMS Vietnam Head represented SIMS in the said event.

Meanwhile, TSU was represented by Dr. Arnold E. Velasco, TSU President; Dr. Jasper Jay N. Mendoza, Vice President for Academic Affairs; Dr. Grace N. Rosete, Director of International Affairs and Linkages (OIAL); Dr. Jhonel C. Panlilio, Dean of the College of Business and Accountancy (CBA); Dr. Brigido B. Corpuz, Presidential Assistant; and Dr. Maria Teresa C. Agustin, CBA IZN coordinator.

Under the agreement, both institutions are set to collaborate

several academic and internationalization initiatives, such as the exchange of undergraduate and/or graduate students, the development and implementation of dual degree programs, the exchange of faculty members,



researchers, and administrative staff, joint participation in international research and academic initiatives, and the organization and participation in seminars, academic workshops, and related events.

Dr. Velasco expressed his optimism about the partnership, noting that, despite the challenges,

the successful signing marks a promising start to the collaboration between TSU and SIMS. "Even amid the storm, we managed to push through with this signing—a clear sign of a strong and positive partnership between TSU and SIMS," Dr. Velasco said.

On the other hand, Dr. Giang conveyed her immense gratitude to the TSU community for making the signing possible. "When I heard about the typhoon, I was worried the event might not happen," Dr. Giang said. "But seeing everyone's effort and warmth shows TSU's strong commitment to this partnership," she emphasized.

Following the formal signing, TSU and SIMS gathered for a roundtable to further discuss the areas of collaboration outlined in the MOU and the roadmaps for prospective projects and activities for both institutions. Shortly after, the SIMS delegation toured TSU, visiting the CBA Dean's Office and the Villa Lucinda Campus.

This partnership between TSU and SIMS reflects their shared commitment to internationalization and advancing education across borders.



## TSU, JMCCON sign MOA to elevate nursing education

Aimed at reinforcing nursing education through educational cooperation, Tarlac State University (TSU) and Jecsons Medical Center – College of Nursing (JMCCON) officially signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) at the TSU Main AVR, July 10, 2025.

The agreement signed by TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco and JMC President Dr. Juanita L. Chua institutes a collaborative partnership concentrated on improving the learning outcomes of JMCCON's nursing students through the support of TSU's academic resources.

Under the MOA, TSU will provide educationally qualified faculty members to teach General Education and liberal arts subjects, through the College of Arts and Social Sciences (CASS), and extend assistance in faculty training, syllabus development, and instructional material preparation, in collaboration with the Office of Curriculum and Instruction (OCI). Meanwhile, JMC will offer professional fees, facilities, and equipment necessary to support the joint activities.

"This is no longer a competition, but a cooperation and collaboration," said Dr. Velasco during the signing.

Dr. Chua expressed optimism about the collaboration, emphasizing its role in strengthening nursing education and professional development in the province. She also noted that such partnerships pave the way for innovative programs and greater opportunities for students and faculty alike.

Also, witnessing the event were Dr. Aloysius T. Madriaga, CASS Dean; Dr. Jose Y. Chua, JMC Corporate Secretary; Ms. Vera A. Santos, JMCCON Dean; Ms. Nancy A. Pae, JMCCON Secretary; and Office of International Affairs and Linkages (OIAL) staff.

## TSU, AIE set stage for joint academic and industry initiatives

## TSU inks pact with Nghe An University through MOU signing

Tarlac State University (TSU) strengthened its international academic linkages through the ceremonial signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Nghe An University (NAU) of Vietnam on November 27, 2025, at the Main AVR. The event was organized in collaboration with the Office of Graduate Studies (OGS) and Office of International Affairs and Linkages (OIAL), reflecting TSU's continued pursuit of global partnerships that support quality higher education.

The signing ceremony opened with welcome remarks from Dr. Jasper Jay N. Mendoza, Vice President for Academic Affairs. He emphasized the growing importance of global academic connections in enhancing TSU's programs, research capabilities, and international visibility.

Formal introductions were led by Dr. Grace N. Rosete, OIAL Director, who presented TSU's attending officials. On the other hand, the NAU delegation

(CCS), College of Engineering and Technology (CET), and the College of Education (COED). The partnership is expected to open pathways for enhanced academic collaboration, graduate student development, and research expansion across these colleges.



## TSU partners with NISU-VSSC to formalize academic ties through MOU
